Quality preschool and K-12

Numerous preschool and K-12 schools, both public and private, are found among the area's towns and cities. More than 18,000 children attend 80 public and private schools in the region. Like all of Iowa, the schools are equipped with fiber optics to provide Web service and enable computer lab instruction. Children receive the modern educational support necessary to grow and excel as they embark on the next stage of their lives. Academic excellence is coupled with numerous opportunities in music, sports, drama, arts, speech, civic leadership and more. Raising the bar through higher education

Five community colleges are either within the member counties or an easy commute away, as are Iowa's three regent universities. In fact, the University of Northern Iowa and the Carroll campus of Des Moines Area Community College join in the state's only collaborative teacher education degree-granting program between a community college and a regent university.

The area's reputable colleges and universities cater to a significantly high nontraditional student base providing opportunities for those students returning to school for personal and professional growth. Nearby colleges offer programs in nursing, business, law, engineering, numerous fields of bioscience and more. Support for local businesses is available via training programs offered at area colleges.
